## NATIVITY, MIGRATION AND BERMUDIAN STATUS

Comparisons with 1991 reveal that the foreign-born population in 2000 grew at a faster rate than the Bermuda-born population, $12 \%$ in contrast to $4 \%$. The foreign-born also added more to their number than the Bermuda-born did. The Bermuda-born totaled 44,290 and comprised $71 \%$ of the population, down two percentage points from 1991. Foreign-born persons amounted to 17,675 or $28 \%$, which was up marginally from $27 \%$ in 1991. (See Table 1.) The rate of growth in the number of foreign-born
 males kept pace with that of their female counterparts, and as a result the sex ratio stayed fixed at 93 males per 100 females. In comparison, the number of Bermuda-born females increased faster than the number of their male counterparts, which resulted in the sex ratio slipping from 94 to 92 . Cause of death statistics

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indicate that the loss over time of males in the young to middle ages to accidents, violence and Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome has contributed to the surplus of females.

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Dis-aggregating the population by nativity and Bermudian status reveals that 97\% of the Bermuda-born population and $31 \%$ of the foreign-born population have Bermudian status. (See Table 2.) During the intercensal period the proportion of foreign-born persons who had acquired Bermudian status increased by 2 percentage points while the non-Bermudian component of the Bermuda-born remained static.

Most of the foreign born with status were long-term residents whilst, expectedly, nearly half of the nonBermudian foreign-born had fewer than five years' stay in the country. Table 3 displays the foreign-born population by years of residence and Bermudian status. Of the 2,065 foreign-born persons who had resided in Bermuda for 20 to 29 years, $55 \%$ had acquired status. Eighty-two percent of those who had made Bermuda their home for at least thirty years had been granted status. Of the 5,863 foreign-born persons who had lived on the Island for fewer than 5 years, $95 \%$ were without status. (See Table 3 and Figure 1.) Among the foreign born, the median number of years of residence for Bermudians increased by 2.1 years, while that for non-Bermudians declined by 0.7 of a year.

An analysis of the foreign born by country of birth reveals that persons from the U nited Kingdom remained the largest of that group at 4,846 persons; however, proportionally this group had declined from $30 \%$ to $27 \%$ of the foreign-born population. (See Table 4 and Figure 2.) Persons born in the United States were the second largest category at 3,413 or $19 \%$. Of note was the substantial rise in both absolute and relative terms of Canadian-born persons. They increased in number by 917 persons and grew in proportion from

$10 \%$ to $14 \%$ of the foreign born. Similarly, persons in the 'other countries' categories rose in number by a considerable $61 \%$ or 751 . Declining in both absolute and relative terms was the number of persons born in the Azores/Portugal from 2,115 to 1,750 or from $13 \%$ to $10 \%$. The proportion of persons born in Caribbean countries remained unchanged.

Of the 5,534 foreign-born persons with status, almost a third were from the United Kingdom. This was down 4 percentage points from 1991. Another twenty-two percent were American, thereby increasing that group's representation by 7 percentage points. Natives of Canada and the West Indies comprised 14\%. Persons from the Azores/Portugal accounted for $10 \%$ of the foreign-born Bermudians. (See Table 5.)

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The countries of predominance for persons without status were similar to those for persons with Bermudian status. Natives of the United Kingdom accounted for a quarter of this group. Next were American and Canadian-born persons at $18 \%$ and $15 \%$, respectively. It is noteworthy, however, that in 2000 persons from the residual group of all other countries comprised 14\% of foreign-born non-Bermudians, compared to $9 \%$ in 1991. The six-percentage-point increase in the proportion of Canadian-born residents, and the five-percentage-point rise in the proportion of persons from the 'other countries' category, highlight the increasing trend of recruiting workers from these regions.

Examining the population by nativity, Bermudian status and age sheds light on the different age structures of the relevant sub-populations. Forty-two percent of the Bermuda-born population was concentrated under the age of 30 years, while only a quarter of the foreign-born population was in this age category. (See Table 6.) Half of the foreign-born population with Bermudian status ( $52 \%$ ) was above the age of 49, while over half of their non-Bermudian counterparts fell between the prime working ages of 30 and 49. This age profile is consistent with the migration patterns of foreign-born workers.
