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HOUSEHOLD SIZE

AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD SIZE DROPS IN 2000

The average household size in 1980 was 2.93 persons, decreasing to 2.61 persons in 1991, with a further drop to 2.47 persons in 2000. The steady decline in household size is related directly to the increase in the number of persons living alone and the declining fertility rate.

Households with only one or two persons increased significantly from 1991 to 2000. **Table 1** shows sizeable shifts of 23% and 19%, respectively. These households together accounted for 59% or 14,897 households.

HOUSEHOLD TYPE


ONE-PERSON HOUSEHOLDS WERE MOST COMMON

The 2000 Census data reveals that the proportion of one-person households increased by 3 percentage points between 1991 and 2000, and replaced two-parent households as the most common household type.

There were just over 7,000 one-person households recorded during the Census. This represented 28% of all households in Bermuda. (See Chart 1 and Table 2.)

Households comprising adult couples only, also grew significantly and represented 20% or roughly 5,000 of total households.

Simultaneously, the number of households with two parents increased to 6,392 compared to 6,284 in 1991. One-parent households maintained their position at 11% of total households or 2,685.



YOUNG ADULTS LIVING ALONE

The proportion of people under 30 years old living alone in 2000 was 33% or 813 households. Men headed 58% or 472 of these households. (See Table 2.) The prevalence of one-person households among householders under 30 years old may reflect the view that some see it as a practical alternative to living in the family home, in an adult couple setting or in some other housesharing arrangement.

SENIORS LIVING ALONE

Of all persons aged 65 years and over, more than one third (38% or 1,665 persons) were living alone. (See Table 2.) These comprised 466 males and 1,199 females. The number of elderly women living alone exceeds that of the men due to higher female life expectancy.
