

CONSUMER PRICE INDEX

JUNE 2011

INFLATION RISES

Consumers paid 2.8 per cent more in June 2011 than they did a year ago for the CPI basket of goods and services. The rate of inflation increased from the 2.5 per cent measured in May.

Between May and June of 2011, the average cost of goods and services in the Consumer Price Index rose 0.3 per cent. The all-items index increased from the 116.3 index points recorded last month, to 116.6 in June 2011. This means that the basket of goods and services that cost \$100.00 in April 2006 now cost \$116.60.

YEAR-TO-YEAR ANALYSIS

The Health & Personal Care sector was the largest contributor to the year-over-year increase in the Consumer Price Index. This sector has been the leading contributor since September 2010 due to the rising average costs of health insurance premiums and prescription drugs. On average, the cost of Health & Personal Care items increased 7.5 per cent since June last year.

The Fuel and Rent sectors also impacted strongly on the annual rate of inflation, as price shifts in these sectors were 11.1 per cent and 1.6 per cent, respectively.

The compilation of the CPI involves the processing of several thousand price quotations. The Department of Statistics wishes to acknowledge the cooperation of the business community in supplying the required price data.

MONTH-TO-MONTH ANALYSIS

Fuel & Power

The Fuel & Power sector increased 2.8 per cent, due to an increase in the fuel adjustment clause. Consumers also paid 3.1 per cent more for a cylinder of gas.

Household Goods, Services & Communications

The Household Goods, Services & Communications sector climbed 1.2 per cent in June. This was largely attributed to a 21.9 per cent increase in the cost of care services at rest homes.

Food

On average, food prices rose 0.5 per cent in June. Among the main items contributing to the increase were the cost of oranges (+5.1 per cent), hotdogs (+4.4 per cent) and cookies (+3.8 per cent).

Rent

The Rent sector increased 0.1 per cent, reflecting a 0.2 per cent rise in average rents for controlled properties.

Health & Personal Care

The Health & Personal Care sector edged up 0.1 per cent in June. This resulted from a 2.8 per cent price increase for prescribed medicines.

Tobacco & Liquor

The Tobacco & Liquor sector increased by 0.2 per cent. The average cost of beer increased 0.5 per cent, while the cost of spirits fell by 0.1 per cent.

COMPUTING PRICE INCREASES

The Department of Statistics receives numerous calls daily requesting the rate of inflation over specific periods of time. The following calculations are provided to guide users as to how to compute rates of price increases. The monthly index numbers can be obtained from our website <u>www.statistics.gov.bm.</u>

a) Month-to-Month Price Change

The price change between November and December, 2007 is calculated as follows:

- $= \frac{\text{Dec } 09 \text{ index number} \text{Nov } 09 \text{ index number}}{\text{Nov } 09 \text{ index number}} \times 100$
- $=\frac{111.6-112.0}{112.0}\times100$
- = -0.3%

Clothing & Footwear


The Clothing & Footwear sector was unchanged in June.

Education, Recreation & Reading

The Education, Recreation & Reading sector declined 0.4 per cent in June. This was due to a 5.3 per cent decrease in the cost of magazines and a 4.3 per cent decline in the cost of boating fuel.

Transport & Vehicles

The Transport & Vehicles sector fell 0.4 per cent in June. Hotel room rates and fuel prices fell by 7.0 per cent and 4.3 per cent, respectively. In contrast, airfare costs increased as average prices climbed by 21.7 per cent.



b) Year-to-Year Price Change (annual rate of inflation)

The price change between December, 2006 and December, 2007 is calculated as follows:

 $= \frac{\text{Dec } 09 \text{ index number} - \text{Dec } 08 \text{ index number}}{\text{Dec } 08 \text{ index number}} \times 100$

$$=\frac{111.6 - 110.5}{110.5} \times 100$$

WHAT IS THE CONSUMER PRICE INDEX?

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a statistical tool used for measuring changes in the general level of prices of consumer goods and services purchased by private households.

The index measures price movements of a given quality and quantity of goods and services. The mix of these consumer goods and services comprising the index, are figuratively thought of as a "shopping basket." In constructing this "shopping basket", the selected goods and services are organized first by commodity type. They are then divided into subcomponents and assigned to a major expenditure group. The Bermuda CPI is structured into nine expenditure groups or sectors:

- Food
- Rent
- Clothing & Footwear
- Tobacco & Liquor
- Fuel & Power
- Transport & Vehicles
- Household Goods, Services & Communications
- Education, Recreation & Reading
- Health & Personal Care

CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

Base Period

The time period which is used as a reference point for measuring the price change of goods and services. The base period for the Bermuda CPI is April 2006.

Price Index Number

A single figure that shows how a set of prices has changed over a specified period of time. An index number on its own means nothing. It must be compared with an index number from another period to have meaning. For example, a comparison of the index number 79.1 for January 1998 with 82.9 for January 2000, reveals that prices have increased by 4.8 percent.

Laspeyres Equation

The CPI is computed using this statistical equation. This formula calculates the total amount of money a household needs today to purchase the same basket of goods and services that it bought in the base period, April 2006.

WEIGHTED AVERAGE

A mathematical formula that takes into account the relative importance of an item's price change compared to the overall change in the sector or CPI.

Inflation

Inflation is the process of rising prices, resulting in diminishing purchasing power of a given sum of money.

Cost of Living Index

Many individuals refer to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) as a cost-of-living index. The CPI is an index of pure price change only. A cost-of-living index reflects the changes in buying or consumption patterns that consumers would ordinarily make to adjust to any change in the price of a good or service.
